



For where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them.'

Today's Mass: Twenty Third Sunday (Year A)

First Reading: God, speaking through Ezekiel, says that the appointed leader must speak out against evil. In the end, it is a matter of (eternal) life and (eternal) death.

Psalm: the psalm recalls the disobedience of the ancestors ('Meribah' means 'strife' and 'Massah' means 'testing'). Instead we must obey God ('listen to his voice').

Second Reading: love is the fulfilling of the law. St Paul lists the very sins about which Jesus speaks in the

Gospel: Christ here speaks forthrightly about the effect of unrepented sin on the community of faith. We tend to think of sin - and therefore forgiveness as well - as personal. But every sin badly wounds the whole community, the Church. The ultimate sanction against a sinner is exclusion (being treated like a pagan or tax collector).

The power to forgive sins ('to loose them') or to withhold forgiveness ('to bind them') is given to the church: thus the Sacrament of Penance is not an optional extra for especially pious people, but is a must for all followers of Christ. When did YOU last go to Confession?

(rite of Christian initiation of adults)

RCIA - What is it?

It is the process by which non-Catholics become Catholics. When the Church speaks about welcoming new people as members it says:

The rite of initiation is suited to a spiritual journey of adults that varies according to the many forms of God's grace, the free co-operation of the individuals, the action of the Church, and the circumstances of time and place. (RCIA 5)

This may need a little unpacking:

The rite of initiation - is how the Church refers to the process of welcoming new members;

is suited to a spiritual journey - it is a time of growth for those seeking to know/experience God in their lives;

of adults - of any age or background;

that varies - there is not one blueprint;

according to the many forms of God's grace - for those who seek Him, God is already at work in their lives; an initial part of the process is to help people recognise this grace, God's blessings, in their lives;

the free co-operation of the individuals - people respond in different ways to God's call;

the action of the Church - to become a Catholic is to be a member of a universal body of believers which is grounded in local parish community;

and the circumstances of time and place - your life situation is an important factor within the process.

RCIA - who is it for?

- intended for those who are not members of the Catholic Church;
- intended for those who wish to explore and understand the faith of the Church;
- begins with a time of enquiry, for asking questions and for reflection. This may is done in a group: both with others who are also seeking and members of the local church;
- can be used by those Baptized a Catholic but who have lapsed and wish to re-connect with the Church.

The Shape of the Rite

To become a Catholic can take some time. It is a journey of faith and like any journey the route is marked by various stages. In RCIA these stages, which might be thought of as turning points, are marked by special rites or liturgies in the church. They are signs of a growing and deepening relationship. Between these turning points are 'periods' — time to get know Jesus and the Church and appreciate that what we believe affects how we live our lives.

There is no overall timetable, though Baptism (Christening) usually takes place at Easter (in the spring). With that as a signpost you can take as long as you need. It is also possible to decide it is not for you.

Our RCIA Course for non-Catholics

Begins with the *Why?* Course on Monday evenings at 8:00pm in the Parish Centre, starting on 25th September. That is followed by the RCIA programme proper, continuing on Monday evenings. Initially it is just 'Come and See'; there is no commitment (that will come later). Both those who have never been Baptized (known as 'catechumens') and those who have been Baptized in another church ('candidates') are invited to come along.

If you know someone who may be interested in becoming a Catholic, please issue a personal invitation to join this course, and please accompany them at least to the first session. Further information can be obtained from Andrew La Trobe via the Parish office.

Diocesan Day for Catechists 23rd September

The annual Day for Catechists, organised by the diocesan Centre for Catholic Formation, is on Saturday 23rd September, at St George's Cathedral. The Day begins at 11:00am, and ends with Mass at 4:00pm, at which catechists will be sent out to catechise on the Archbishop's behalf. Holydays of Obligation

With effect from the First Sunday of Advent 2017, two holydays of obligation are being reinstated, and consequently transferred from the adjacent Sunday back to their proper day. The **Epiphany of the Lord** will now be observed on 6th January (unless it falls on a Saturday or Monday when it is transferred to the Sunday). The **Ascension of the Lord** will be on the Thursday after the Sixth Sunday of Easter (ie 40 days after the Resurrection). From the Desk of the Parish Priest

Hard questions about the Old Testament



ome difficult questions remain. What about the portrayal of a violent, vengeful and frankly unappealing God? How can we reconcile the Genesis account of creation with Darwinism? What is the relevance to us today of certain passages, such as the cultic requirements in Leviticus which we no longer observe?

One answer is that we can't pick and choose which bits to retain and which bits to throw overboard; no two people would select the same bits. And in any case, human nature being what it is, we would be tempted to keep the easy, consoling parts and get rid of the challenging, difficult parts. The Hebrew scriptures have come down to us, wholesale, as part of our scriptures.

Secondly, we are dealing with a mystery, the mystery which is God and his covenant relationship with his people. Although we can appreciate some aspects of this, we should not expect that interpreting the scriptures will always be easy. Indeed, it should sometimes be hard, requiring struggling with the text by theologians over many years. We are not perfect yet, so we will not fully comprehend God yet.

'How odd of God to choose the Jews'. This famous saying should alert us to the fact that, thirdly, we need to understand the Jewish context in which the Old Testament books were written, and to recognise the different literary forms or genres in which they were written. We have to do this even for much more recent texts (such as Magna Carta or Chaucer's 'The Canterbury Tales'). If we are to understand the Old Testament writers properly, we can't short circuit this.

This mistake is made by people such as Professor Dawkins, who claim that Genesis, being written so long ago, conflicts with our modern scientific knowledge. The creation account is a story asserting that God created the universe. It is not a scientific, physics treatise about the origins of the universe. (Incidentally, it is remarkable how Genesis, with its symbolic, picture language, is consistent with the modern scientific account of the Big Bang.) Just because something was written millennia ago does not mean that it cannot be a revelation about God, that it cannot be true.

Dawkins also writes "The God of the Old Testament is arguably the most unpleasant character in all fiction" ('The God Delusion'). (He does, at least, concede that Jesus is a huge improvement!) But a careful, close reading shows that although God is indeed wrathful when his people disobey him, and follow idolatry and wickedness, ultimately he is a God of love. His love for his people does not waver, however bad their transgressions.


We have to interpret the Old Testament carefully and holistically; then we will not misunderstand it by extracting only short sections out of context.


The old testament puts a spring in our step & a song in our hearts.

Fourthly, we are members of the New Covenant (of Jesus Christ). This means that some of the prescriptions of the Old Covenant – such as not eating shellfish or pork – have been superseded. They applied to the Jews then, but not to us today. Many of the old prescriptions do still apply, especially those which are part of basic divine law or where Jesus has restated them. Thus the Ten Commandments – which forbid murder, adultery and so on – do still form our basic moral code as Christians. See Galatians 3:17.

Stuart Blanch (a former Anglican Archbishop of York) wrote that the Old Testament is "a jungle of chaotic ideas, unfinished themes and tangled history". Indeed it is. But he goes on to say "it is a book which is meant to throw some light on our path, to put a spring in our step and a song in our hearts … It expresses the mind of God … it is a book for all mankind … an ancient source of experience and wisdom". And so it is.
